FWS rule on La. pine snake makes Register

The 4(d) Rule for protection of the Louisiana pine snake has been finalized and published in the Federal Register. The publication, attached to this email and posted to the Louisiana Forestry Association's website, can be downloaded for those wanting to read though the document in PDF form.

The reptile was listed as threatened under the Endangered Species Act in 2018.

"The Louisiana pine snake has been on the radar for a very long time, but was finally listed at a time of significant change within the US Fish & Wildlife Service," said Paul Stone, chairman of the Endangered Species Committee for the Louisiana Forestry Association.

Stone said with the snake being listed as threatened rather than endangered, the Fish & Wildlife Service was able "to recognize that continued active forest management is beneficial to the survival of the snake within its range, and develop a 4(d) rule that reduces the impact of the listing on forest landowners and managers."

Joe Ranson, field supervisor for the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service (FWS), said his office is working on developing a key for the Louisiana pine snake to be included in IPAC — Information for Planning and Consultation — an online service that allows anyone to determine whether they have to clear a project in an area that could have the pine snake.

He said once established, possibly in April, a forester or landowner wanting to plan a harvest or replanting could, through a series of questions, find out whether a plan would have to be considered through FWS.

If the program determines there would be no effect or not likely to have an adverse effect, approval could

be granted through the online program. If it could likely have an adverse effect, the plan would have to be approved through FWS.

Stone said most sustainable forestry practices likely will be unchanged.

"Consultation with the service will not be necessary for many normal forest management activities when done as outlined in the rule," said Stone.

Highlights of 2019

- Through the Forest Political Action Council (ForPAC), more than \$60,000 was raised during the previous four-year election cycle. With those funds, ForPAC supported 26 candidates for the Louisiana Legislature. Of those races, only four did not win their elections.
- The Louisiana Forestry Foundation in 2019 surpassed the \$1 million mark in the amount of scholarships it has awarded to forestry students at the state's three four-year colleges and two community colleges. It was the 52nd year the Foundation has awarded scholarships. Last year, 56 scholarships helped students studying forestry at Louisiana Tech University, Louisiana State University, Southern University and the Forestry Technician program at the Central Louisiana Technical Community College Huey P. Long Campus in Winnfield and the Southwest Louisiana Technical and Community College Oakdale campus. That brought the total scholarship money awarded to forestry students to \$1,018,200 since the inception of the Foundation's program in 1967. We also have a new endowed scholarship.
- With help of the volunteers among the LFA membership, more than 1,000 fifth-graders from

Rapides Parish schools were able to venture into the great outdoors at Indian Creek Recreation Area and East Kincaid Boat Launch to learn about forestry and its importance to their community.

- A partnership with Hunt Forest Products and Tolko Industries Ltd. formed the LaSalle Lumber Co. and opened the first new lumber mill in Louisiana in the past 25 years. Hunt and Tolko are family-owned companies with similar goals and values. "We look forward to a long and fruitful relationship with them," said Trott Hunt, co-owner and chairman of the board of directors of Hunt Forest Products.
- Drax is expanding their consumption of wood in Louisiana and began installing a 175-rail-car-spur in Urania, which equates to more than a mile of track on which full pellet cars will use to send the pellets to the port of Baton Rouge and eventually Europe.
- RoyOMartin announced multimillion-dollar expansion of its plants at Chopin and Oakdale, giving more capacity for Louisiana wood to be used for building projects across the region.
- The Louisiana Forestry Association website and Facebook page regularly engaged the public in timely issues.
